Once more into the breach of World War Two, this time totally set in France. This remains the only title in the main series never to be released for PC, as well as Treyarch's debut (they'll go on to do Black Ops).

DEVELOPER: Infinity Ward FOR: PC, PS3, X360 Part two of number four (what?), this marks the franchise really hitting its stride, grossing over a billion big smackers as well as courting controversy with the infamous airport sequence No Russian, where you can opt to gun down a bunch of civilians.





DEVELOPER: Infinity Ward FOR: PC, PS3, X360 At the time this is the biggest entertainment launch ever, making \$1 billion throughout the world in 16 days. It keeps to the successful COD formula, but making big tweaks to multiplayer.

DEVELOPER: Infinity Ward FOR: PC, PS3, X360, PS4, Xbox One THIS TIME, South America has united as one superglobal mega-cock called 'The Federation'. There's something called kinectic bombardment from outer space and all that's left are the 'Ghosts'. Does that make sense to you? No? Who the fuck cares, WE PLAYED IT AND IT'S WICKED.

The single player campaign is pretty well-trodden ground, albeit with a bit more of an underdog story. It's an all-out battle for survival - you're no longer freeing the oppressed, you're just making sure you've still got a home to eat Oreos in. What you really care about though is the multiplayer, which is bigger, better and way more intense than ever before.


The environments are now destructable, which makes every level feel different each time you play. The game's a lot more solid, and you really feel like you're moving around the level, rather than just controlling a floating gun hand. Our favourite new feature was the mini challenges popping up throughout the match. Killing people horribly's never been so much fun











KENT IS sometimes referred to by wankers as The Garden Of England, and sure it might look nice on the surface but underneath the flower beds, rockeries and water features there's something dirtier than soil.

Slaves are the latest in a line of garage-punks to slap our ears into submission and it's easy to see why with their ballsy, lo-fi tunes that rarely break a three-minute runtime. But for all the racket these dudes make there's only two of them – it was originally for writing purposes but it turned out so well they settled as a two-piece. "If we ever did expand," says drummer and vocalist Isaac Holman (head in

pocket), "the idea of a Hammond organ or female backing singers is more appealing than a bassist."

Comprising just a drummer and guitarist (Laurie, playing pool) while sharing vocal duties, the amount of noise they can muster is deafening. But despite sounding like they've escaped from the 1977 punk scene, it's not their inspiration: "We are into songs rather than genres, it's such a wide range, there are no boundaries. But there's no fighting or spitting – we don't like that kind of thing – our shows are hectic and lively but it's all in jest and good spirit." If you want to catch these guys, they tour with Vuvuvultures in November. Do it.

Q&A ISAAC HOLMAN (DRUMS/VOCALS)

SO HOW DID SLAVES START?

I was in a band and Laurie (guitar/vocals) used to come and watch us from time to time – we often talked about making music. Around that time our bassist left and I asked Laurie if he was up for taking his place – he obliged. After a month or so we mutually decided that we weren't happy so we broke off and started Slaves. That was when our love began to blossom.

WE'VE SEEN VIDEOS OF YOU PLAYING

WE'VE SEEN VIDEOS OF YOU PLAYING THE DRUMS WHILE STANDING UP, HOW THE FUCK DID THAT START?

When we started Slaves we were eager to start writing some songs but didn't have a proper drummer. Laurie just suggested that I should give it a go and it worked. It's just steering wheel drumming at the end of the day. It keeps the rhythm while Laurie does his thing and I say what needs to be said.

WHAT'S THE MOST PUNK THING YOU'VE EVER DONE?

Once we stopped on a double yellow so I could run into a local newsagents and get a couple of Kinder Buenos for us. Does that count?

WHEN YOU FIRST LAUNCHED 2000AD, DID YOU HAVE ANY IDEA IT WOULD BECOME THIS HUGE?

Yeah. I did. Thus when the publisher said he wanted it to be called 2000AD, I queried it, saying "What happens when we reach the millennium?" He didn't think we would. I knew we would. In fact, it should have been

bigger. If you're skeptical, consider this:

Games Workshop started at the same time and were smaller.

WHAT WERE YOUR AIMS?

On the surface – to sell a lot of copies, which meant NOT appealing to fanboys who would have been into Gerry Anderson or Marvel or Warrior, but to mainstream readers who are usually the last people comic buffs think about. Beneath the surface – to subvert. We weren't punks, but that's a quick way of saying it.

WAS NEMESIS INTENDED AS A ONE-OFF OR WAS THERE A GRAND PLAN?

A bit of both. I wanted to prove that weird ideas could work. And evolving the story in small one-offs helped with the considerable development. And of course it was starring my favorite hero, the Devil. He'd always had a bad press and I wanted to change that.

HOW MUCH OF HIS MYTHOLOGY WAS MAPPED OUT AT THE START?

There were some gaps. I didn't know what "Be Pure, be Vigilant, Behave" meant. Who was Torquemada warning us about? Then it came to me in a flash - those filthy aliens! Don't breed with them. Watch out for them. And don't do anything "deviant".

THESE DAYS PORTRAYING A RELIGIOUS LEADER LIKE TORQUEMADA AS A PSYCHOTIC FASCIST WOULDN'T RAISE MANY FYEBROWS, BUT DID YOU HAVE ANY TROUBLE BACK AT THE BEGINNING?

No. But I was careful not to use words like


"Your Holiness" or "the power of prayer". So he'd say "meditate". These days, I'd be more direct, for example, a young monk falls at his feet. The monk says "Your Holiness, may I kiss your ring?" and Torquemada says "Later, perhaps." Torquemada was based on the mad monks who taught me at school and one in particular who left the order and had a minor record hit. He was known as "The Swinging Monk." Don't Google those words.

IS NEMESIS THE WEIRDEST THING YOU'VE EVER PUBLISHED?

No, that's probably something in girls' comics. Like in Girl In A Bubble, where a girl with no immunity to disease is kept in a giant bubble and fed through an airlock, then one day she figures how to unlock the door to the bubble. That is arguably weirder than zombies, Celtic barbarians, robots and alien heroes














IN SPACE, NO-ONE CAN HEAR YOU PLAY

ALIEN ACTION FIGURES WERE PLANNED WHEN THE MOVIE CAME OUT IN 1979, BUT THEY NEVER BECAME A REALITY... UNTIL NOW

ALIEN IS awesome. The alien itself looks amazing, the whole thing's genuinely scary, and space travel had never been depicted in as skanky, unglamorous a manner before. It's the opposite of its later semi-prequel Prometheus, in that Alien is really good and Prometheus is a sad wet fart.

Alien received huge acclaim, a bunch of Oscars and kickstarted a franchise, but one thing it didn't get was action figures. Toys were designed, and prototypes made, but it didn't go any further.

24 years later, they exist, thanks to the efforts of American toy company Super7, who tracked down the original prototypes, moulds and designs. "We always knew they existed" says Super7 owner Brian Flynn. "I've spent the last few years tracking down all the prototypes and the people that had them. In the case of Dallas, all that existed were internal photographs, so we had to do the sculpt from them."

The figures are available for preorder, and should turn up in places like Forbidden Plant by Christmas or so, and are clearly fucking brilliant.

"If you're a die-hard action figure guy you've known what they are, but they've always been the thing you couldn't have" says Bryan. "Well, now you can."



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

During the 89 Sodom tour people were starting to like us more than Sodom. Their tour manager took three showers a day – we called him Mr. Clean – and during our shows he would fuck with us by cutting our lights and sound because he was jealous that we were more popular. We were traveling on the same bus and my bunk was across from him, so I came up with a plan and decided not to shower for the rest of the tour. After two weeks he was like "You've gotta get that guy to take a shower! He's gross, I cant sleep!" I refused. I never saw him after that, I think I pissed him off for life. The band was cool, but he was a total dick.

DON'T GO OVERBOARD

I was drinking rum next to Eddie Vedder on the Ministry tour bus once. I took a huge chug and it came back up all over Eddie's legs. When he was cleaning himself off I went over and said "Sorry I puked on you, but my sister is a huge fan and I need an autograph!" I grabbed a napkin and he signed it. Ministry's tour manager was like "Ok, you've had enough, gimme that bottle." When he reached for the bottle I cracked it over his head. There was blood everywhere. Al Jourgenson gave me three valium and I passed out. I woke up next morning, couldn't remember anything and saw the tour manager with a bandage on his head. I said "What happened to you? Rough night?" He went "You don't remember you motherfucker! You clocked me in the head you bastard! I had 15 stitches!"

We were in a restaurant in Portugal and there was a guy smoking a cigar and stinking the place out, so I bet that if I took off my shoes, the stench would outdo the smoke. 
waiter found my shoes and ended up tossing them in the trash! I won the bet though, I got €100 in the process.

We were playing a Soulfly show in the Czech Republic and my son Richie sang with us. He stage-dived and his knee got caught in the barriers at the front of the stage. There was blood gushing out everywhere and he went to the hospital for 20 stitches. When he got out I was like "Now you've got some battle scars." It was a proud moment.

LEARN YOUR OWN LESSONS TOO!

We were playing with Napalm Death and I was hanging out with Mitch before the show doing cocaine – we got so hyper and they were like "You're gonna sing Nazi Punks Fuck Off with us!" I planned to jump over the drum kit and land at the front and start singing – in my mind I'd be Superman! So I jumped, but I landed on the cymbal and shattered my collarbone. But I got up and sang the song! The next morning I took my shirt off and my chest was black. That's my worst battle scar, but it's all fun and games!

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


COULD YOU GUYS SURVIVE A REAL MEDIEVAL BATTLE?

I think Bryan could but I'm not sure about the rest of us. I hope he doesn't take this the wrong way but he's the cockroach of our band – he can survive almost anything. Whereas the rest of us aren't built for medieval times. I've got terrible vision and weak joints – we're just too frail. Although if you got David riled up he can be pretty wily – he has hidden strengths buried in his beard.

YOU'VE ALL GOT BEARDS EXCEPT FOR JOHN, DOES HE EVER GET RINSED FOR NOT HAVING ONE?

He does but not by us – we understand that it's not by choice because he can't grow a beard which is why he grew a moustache while in Europe. I'm going bald too and I can't do anything about it so feel free to give me shit about it. All I can do is say "Yeah, you're right. Good observation."

YOU GUYS ARE KNOWN FOR BEING BIG DRINKERS LIKE OURSELVES, HAVE YOU NOTICED A DIFFERENCE BETWEEN For the type of people that come to our shows there's not a huge difference. But for people in England it seems like it's more accepted to be utterly completely shitfaced. You see more shitfaced people walking round like "Hey man, what's up?" who aren't embarrassed about being that drunk cos they know they're gonna be fine tomorrow. But the Red Fang crowd aren't shy about going to the bar.



We played a show in The Netherlands on the last tour that had brought 3000 litres of beer and before we had even finished our set they were completely out of beer.

A FEW YEARS AGO YOU FEATURED ON AN ADULT SWIM METAL COMPILATION, WOULD YOU SOUNDTRACK A CARTOON?

There was a short time when I wasn't playing in bands where I thought this would be a direction to go in where I'd still be making music. If I couldn't play live I could still make music for TV or movies. But I don't know what show would be appropriate for doing a theme for – Robot Chicken would have been great cos it's so shitty and half-

assed like us. I love the show – it's got this garbagey charm to it and I think Red Fang would match up perfectly. Aqua Teen Hunger Force wouldn't really work for us. There's a show called Eastbound & Down on HBO and back in 2008 we were on tour with a band called Early Man and we heard rumours from our label that we were in the running to have Prehistoric Dog

as the theme tune for a new HBO show. We didn't know what it was but it turned out it was between us and one other band. We got to Chicago on tour and started watching Eastbound & Down and the opening credits come on and it's Early Man and at that moment realised that was the show and the band we were on tour with got the slot instead of us so we were super-pissed.

YOU'RE SYNONYMOUS WITH BEER AND WEED, IS RED FANG BEST LISTENED TO WITH A JOINT AND A CAN?

For sure! A lot of music is best enjoyed smoking a joint and having a beer – being mellow and just hanging out. I just turned 40 so I have a lot of friends who've just moved past their 'party age' don't listen to heavy metal any more and they listen to Red Fang when they're working out – which is a little disturbing but it works.

DO YOU SMOKE AND DRINK A BIT

DO YOU SMOKE AND DRINK A BIT BEFORE WRITING?

I have to have a couple of drinks before recording vocals cos I can't loosen up enough otherwise. And there are certain songs where we have to smoke to get into the right mindset to relax and play the same riff over and over. We've all got such short attention spans we get too bored and want to move on before we let it develop properly. Even with Prehistoric Dog the part that we sing over was way way shorter before we decided to get stoned and play it again. Instead of playing it four times we played it 64 times to make it awesome. There's a danger that if you're writing when super stoned you're writing bad music but you can't tell. FRONT

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



I don't really have a particular favourite album because I'm into so many different types of music. I love trying to find new, great stuff to listen to so I'm never stuck with one thing for any really long period of















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

OVERKILL MOTÓRHEAD FOUND ON: Overkill

This band changed my perspective on music in terms of seeing it as a blunt instrument, which is what I turned out to do with my own musical approach.
They were that hybrid of rock 'n'
roll and punk, and I'd never heard anything like them before. They were associated with the rock/metal scene in the late 70s/early 80s, but were more direct, straight ahead, nasty and loose than any of the other metal bands. The rest of them relied on dexterity but Motörhead were pure bludgeon. They sounded like they were coming off the rails, and for me, that epitomizes the best facets of music - stuff that sounds about to fall apart but keeps on track.

SWANS

SWANS

FOUND ON: Cop (1984) The term no-wave

gets bandied about a lot, but it's used inaccurately a lot to put a label on something that tries to be a bit out there but doesn't always get there. Swans were definitely out there. They're ominous, completely bleak and homicidal and suicidal. Their stuff's incredibly slow but still rhythmic. Swans are like a more aggressive form of Joy Division in terms of capturing bleakness and hopelessness. We ripped off the Half Life riff and turned it into a track of our own, that we're opening with at the moment, Multinational Corporations Part 2. We're shameless about ripping other bands off.



UNGOVERNABLE

FOUND ON: The

Ungovernable Force (1986) The album's great, but equal to that, it really got me thinking about what was really going on behind our backs. The album was about police brutality, which there was a lot of going on at the time. I already had a really active mind, but that got me thinking "Why do I have to accept that these are the laws and I must obey them? I have the right to disagree, to oppose". There were other bands like Crass and stuff, but I arrived at Conflict first.



FOUND ON: To Mega Therion (1985).

There was this explosion of death metal in the mid 80s, and I laughed at a lot of Satanic bands, but Celtic Frost

had a certain foresight to them. They dabbled in the occult, and the singer Tom was friends with HR Giger, so they've always had a bizarre, unearthly element to them. HR Giger painted the cover for this album, where Jesus is on the cross being used as a catapult. I'd say it was one of the best covers of all time. That whole album is a work of genius, and it takes a lot for me to say that about something. I'd urge anybody that has even the smallest fondness for metal to listen to this album.



DISCHARGE

FOUND ON: Why 12"

Again, it's pure bludgeon. The guys couldn't necessarily play their instruments, but the vibe, the feel you got from it, was amazing. My favourite recordings are analogue recordings, I love that sound because it feels like a band just laying something down, going for it. That's part of the excitement. The funny thing is, Discharge are always classed as a punk band or hardcore band, but it was the early 80s when the whole 70s punk thing was kind of tailing off, so a lot of people that listened to punk fucking hated Discharge. Oh, the irony of punks thinking you're too noisy and obnoxious-sounding.



FOUND ON: Leather, Bristles, Studs & Acne

This was more of a straight up "I'm a punk rocker" album. It was one of the first things that turned my head when I was exploring beyond metal. I was young when I got semi-fanatical about music, so in my teens I was already getting bored and finding metal a bit twee. People over-romanticise the Birmingham scene a bit, but it would be true to say that there was such a melting pot of music that it was easy to find something to latch onto. Leather, Bristles, Studs & Acne just says "I'm a punk rocker, fuck off!" Fantastic band, and friends of mine to this day.



AKMAGEUUUN

SIEGE FOUND ON: Drop Dead demo (1984)

We bang on about Siege in interviews a lot. They came from a fertile, energetic hardcore scene in Boston, and were one of those bands that just took the speed and ferocity of the music beyond most. A lot of the bands that have existed at the faster end of hardcore punk since then have named them as a blueprint. The title of the demo, Drop Dead, tells

you everything you need to know. It's aural savagery. There's a video on YouTube that shows you how much oomph they'd put in – they do a track in a hall, and they put so much into it that the singer visibly almost passes out from screaming too hard. Absolutely seminal stuff. Occasionally you get a demo or an album that's just a moment in time that will never be replicable.



DEAD CAN DANCE

FOUND ON: Dead Can Dance (1984)

The guitarists in Napalm were very influenced by Dead Can Dance. We've had a few mellow parts in our music but we could never be as mellow as them. I saw them in London and I've never seen anything like it. They shut the bar and nobody complained, they were so mesmerised. Lisa Gerrard, the singer, was up the front with this stringed instrument that looked like a pulpit, and the rest of the band were rotating behind her. The acoustics they created - fucking hell! That live show was another dimension.



KRAFTWERK FOUND ON: Tour De

France Soundtracks (2003) How the fuck could a band have the balls to make an album about a bicycle race? It makes me laugh every time I hear it. It's a great album. There are tracks named after stimulants and stuff. There's one called Vitamin Aerodynamic. It just sounds ridiculous to make a record about cycling, but it's a great piece of work. I got into that stuff quite late – when I was younger I was all into finding the next extreme thing, horrible fucking aggression, but as time went on I got more of an appreciation for music like this.



RAW POWER

FOUND ON: Screams

From The Gutter (1984)

These guys were from Italy, an early hardcore band from when punk hadn't properly turned into hardcore. They were like a load of Ritchie Blackmores in a hardcore band. You know how people joke about "More cowbell"? They unashamedly used a cowbell on their album. That was patently not punk rock at all, but they got it in there to great effect. They'd do these mad arpeggios that people in hardcore bands shouldn't be able to play. They weren't trying to be pretentious, they could just play like fuck.

ROWING UP, DID YOU ALWAYS WANT TO ILLUSTRATE FOR A LIVING

OR DID IT JUST FALL INTO PLACE? Growing up I always drew a lot and

loved art but I was never careerminded, I never went to university or chased jobs. It just grew organically from playing in rock'n'roll bands.

WHAT'S BEEN YOUR FAVOURITE PROJECT TO DATE?

I'm not really sure. Every project is enjoyable in some way. I enjoy projects that push me, that get me out of my comfort zone and force me to learn or think differently. I get bored easily and need to be constantly changing. I can't do the same style over and over again. That would drive me insane. I am a curious person and I like to learn, so every project has something good.

WHAT WOULD YOU SAY ARE YOUR MAIN SOURCES OF INSPIRATION?

I would say daily life and personal experiences. 50s/60s rock 'n' roll. Outsider artists, cartoons, other human beings, stand-up comedians.

WHAT ARTISTS OR ILLUSTRATORS **HAVE INFLUENCED YOU MOST OVER THE YEARS? DO YOU HAVE ANY FAVOURITES RIGHT NOW?**

I have a whole bunch of artist/ illustrators that I admire, and at different times in my life I would try to emulate them or understand how they got the results they did. People like John K, Jim Phillips, Rick Griffin, Robert Crumb At the moment I'm more focused on my own storytelling. I'm not worried about aesthetics - the aesthetic is a vehicle to help carry the message across.

YOU ALSO CREATE ANIMATIONS. **WAS THIS SOMETHING YOU WERE ALWAYS WORKING TOWARDS?**

I've always been drawn to it, but never really pursued studying it at school or anything. I taught myself with heaps of books and online tutorials and things, and now I get paid to do it!

WHAT WERE YOUR FAVOURITE **CARTOONS GROWING UP?**

I enjoyed Ren & Stimpy, Looney Tunes and Roger Ramjet. I enjoyed most cartoons. Eating a bowl of Coco Pops while watching cartoons before going for a skate was my usual afternoon growing up.


WHAT DO YOU DO WHEN YOU'RE **NOT DRAWING?**

WHAT WOULD BE THE END OF THE **RAINBOW FOR YOU?**




















HE'S A SKATEBOARDING LEGEND WHO HAS FLOWN THE FLAG FOR BRITISH SKATEBOARDING IN THE STATES FOR NEARLY TWO DECADES - AND IT DOESN'T LOOK LIKE HE'S EVER GONNA STOP

EY GEOFF! HOW DAUNTING WAS IT TO MOVE TO CALIFORNIA FROM LIVERPOOL?

It was completely trippy, it took at least 18 months to adjust to the different social structure and every other aspect of American culture. It's kind of a clash if you're from Liverpool and have never been there before – so I had no friends there. It took a little while to adjust.

WHO DID YOU GO THERE WITH?

I went out there with Jeremy Fox and Ian Deacon who are the founders of Flip Skateboards, on 2 July 1994. I got off the plane, went straight to a Denny's, then straight to where I was staying. I walked out the door, and there was a cop right outside the door and the cop just said to me "Go back inside". This was my first experience with the US and I said to the cop "What do you mean go back inside?" He asked me how old I was, I told him I was 18 and he asked me for ID. I said "No" and he just repeated himself and told me to go back inside. So I turned around and just went back inside to the apartment. That was my 'Welcome to America'.

BUT IT'S FUN NOW, RIGHT?

I've lived there almost 20 years so I must have enjoyed it and it must have been somewhere I wanted to stay, but it was mainly the skateboarding and the weather. Then I started to get to know some people in Huntington Beach who became good, close friends like Ed Templeton and some of the dudes that are from there. A lot of them got the English humour, so once I started to hang out with those guys I felt a little more comfortable and felt like it'd work.

HOW DID YOU START SKATING FOR VANS, COS YOU RODE FOR AIRWALK BEFORE, RIGHT?

Yeah, well Vans were the only shoes I wanted to ride! I rode for Airwalk because as a kid all of the dudes that rode for Airwalk were my heroes. They made great shoes and were always coming out with the freshest stuff, and I stayed on them as long as I possibly could because the original shoe designer was a close friend of mine. His name was Sinn, God rest his soul he's passed away, but he was pretty much like "It's not looking good right now [for Airwalk]". And the only company I wanted to ride

for were Vans cos they were the only shoes I wanted to skate in!

THE ROWLEY PRO AND ROWLEY XLTS WERE AWESOME.

There were XLTs, XL2s, XL3, there were Shams, Slims, the Rowley Pros which have been re-introduced again which were my first pro shoes on Vans. There's been a ton. There were the Rowley Squares – there's a lot of them! And to tell you the truth I'm stoked on all of them, there hasn't been one shoe that I've had with Vans that I'm not happy about.

HOW DID YOU BECOME A SKATER ON THE TONY HAWK GAMES?

Well, the original investor in Flip when it was moved from England to the US was actually Tony Hawk – but a lot of people probably don't know that. Flip has always had a pretty close ties with Tony as a friend and he's always been a supporter of Flip and its riders and what we try to do which was to bring a British-based company to America and make it worldwide and just base it in California. I'm thankful that Tony asked me to be a part of that right out of the gate. That's pretty much how it happened, Tony just called me!

WHEN YOU WERE SHOOTING FOR FLIP'S VIDEO SORRY, DID YOU HAVE A TRICK LIST OR WERE YOU JUST GOING OUT AND FILMING WHAT YOU DID ON THAT DAY?

Neither! I'd have ideas of things I'd like to skate but I'm one of those guys that comes up with an idea and goes "Yeah, maybe I could do that!" and then that's all I think about. I don't have a routine to build up to. A lot of times I just go "Okay, I think I can do that" then I forget about it completely, go there with a filmer and a photographer and just see what happens. I never go back to a spot. If I don't get stuff I never go back and try it again. I've never had a trick list for anything I've filmed - I've never had a line pre-thought out for a competition. I freestyle every aspect of it, it keeps it refreshing. That's street skateboarding for me.

IN THAT VIDEO DID YOU HAVE A FAVOURITE TRICK?

I don't really have a favourite trick from any video. I don't really look at it like that, when we've finished those videos I get really stoked that we documented a period of my life. Then three, four years later you can look back and get a good idea of how you're skating based on what you can see in the video. That's why I like doing video parts, that's the driving force of why I like making those videos. It's just documenting different periods of your skating. That in itself brings up memories from whatever happened during the filming of a certain trick or wherever you happened to be in your head.

BACK WHEN THOSE VIDEOS CAME OUT, FLIP SEEMED TO HAVE THE BEST TEAM IN SKATEBOARDING –

DID IT FEEL LIKE THAT?

Yeah, we've still got the best team in skateboarding, in my humble opinion (laughs). We've got Louie Lopez, Curren Caples, Laun Oliveria, David Gonzalez... that's a pretty gnarly team. Bob Burnquist, Lance Mountain, Aarto Sari, Tom Penny. I'm really proud of what the team has achieved by themselves and also as a part of Flip.

ALSO AROUND THAT TIME THERE WERE NO AMERICAN PROS ON THE FLIP ROSTER. WAS THIS A CONSCIOUS DECISION?

Yeah it was a conscious decision, we're always looking for guys and they can come from anywhere, and at the time most were based in Southern Cali so it wasn't for lack of looking in the US there was just nobody that fit the mould of Flip at the time. That's just the way it worked out. But even during that period we had some amateur skaters from the US that we had tried but that didn't really make it into the video and things like that. So no, it wasn't intentional and hasn't been since or prior to that.

HOW'S THE COMMENTARY GOING FOR YOU ON STREET LEAGUE?

It's fun! I did it in Portland when it was there and then I just did it at the championships, which is straight into the deep end. The production side is a new thing for me where you run through every second of the whole TV show and do rehearsals and stuff like that. That was a new format for me which was definitely an adjustment but I enjoyed it! I love watching skateboarding and it's easy for me to comment on great skateboarding. FRONT



WHAT'S YOUR FAVOURITE SWEAR WORD?

This seems like such a negative question. Nobody goes around saying "Hey, fuck you, friend!"

I'm in the studio all the time at the moment, but I got really into canoeing recently. I used to be massively into tennis when I

was younger as well. I'm also quite into cycling. My studio's in this bit of London where there's not a lot around it, and I've been keeping the bike there, so sometimes I'll have an idea, come up with a tune, and roadtest it riding around deserted streets on my own at night.

THE MOST DISGUSTING THING YOU'VE EVER EATEN?

Squid marinated in its own guts. There are all these sushi bars round the fish market in Japan for the people that work on the market, it's quite a local thing. You go in there, and they give you whatever they've got. Some of it was amazing, like the scallops and tuna belly, but some bits were a bit much.

10 THE WORST INJURY YOU'VE EVER SUFFERED?

Last year I broke a glass in my hand, severed a nerve in my finger and had to do shows a week later with weird restricted hand movements. I had to have an operation and stuff, but besides that I've been really lucky.

12 WHO WAS YOUR CHILDHOOD HERO?

Probably Kurt Cobain. When I was a teenager I was a huge Nirvana fan. At the time I wasn't thinking about becoming a musician as a job, but then I was always in bands, and eventually that led to me using computers to make music.

13 IF YOU WEREN'T A MUSICIAN, WHAT WOULD YOU BE DOING?

Probably something in art or design. I always really liked making stuff. I liked art a lot at school, and I really like graphic design – I always get really involved with the graphic side of my music, and even the lighting and stuff.

14 WHAT WAS THE FIRST ALBUM YOU EVER

It was Use Your Illusion I by Guns N' Roses. Strictly speaking my mum might have bought that one for me...

15 FAVOURITE SMELL?

One of my favourites is the smell of dubplates. Back when I used vinyl, in order to play a brand new song you'd get an acetate cut, which is a one-off record. They have an amazing nice plasticy smell to them. They're these metal vinyl discs in acetate that allows you to cut into them. Vinyl's quite tough, so has to be made in a mould, so has to be mass-produced, whereas a dubplate can be made in a big ancient lathe as a one-off. It's a fun process, but the technical advancements of computers outweigh the benefits of vinyl. I play with a USB stick now.

16 BOOZE OF CHOICE?
I don't really like alcohol that much, but I'm partial to something like a Peroni I guess. I'm not a big aficionado, I'll take what I'm given.

YOU'VE EVER NEEDED TO GO TO THE TOILET?

You know what, I don't think I've wet myself since I was a child. My adulthood's been dry.

16 WHAT WOULD BE YOUR SUPERPOWER OF CHOICE?

One of the builders drilled though the






covers from bar napkins.

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





DO YOU HAVE ONE ON THE GO AT THE MOMENT?



THEY BROUGHT BACK THE RAWNESS

In 1993, hazardous levels of mum-friendly poppiness were starting to creep into hiphop. And while Wu-Tang Clan's debut single Protect Ya Neck didn't halt the oncoming avalanche of R'n'B choruses and cheeseball samples, it did inspire the underground to fight back with unprecedented new levels of bloody-knuckled rawness.

Filthy drums, weird hooks, choppy flows and bizarre, unnerving lyrics ('I'll be stickin' pins in your head like a fuckin' nurse') – Protect Ya Neck landed on hip-hop like a nail bomb. For the full grimy effect, watch the accompanying video: clearly shot on a budget of about six dollars outside New York's very shittiest tower block, it's rougher than a big bear's arse.





THEY MADE NOO YAWK #1 AGAIN

Although hip-hop had been born and raised in NYC, the G-funk explosion of the early 90s had refocused attention onto the West Coast, and the slick, sun-kissed likes of Snoop, Dr Dre and Ice Cube were garnering all the buzz, fame and fortune. When the Wu broke through, however, they reminded hip-hop fans just how much they enjoyed the chilly, jagged sounds of Noo Yawk rap; this paved the way for the likes of Biggie and Jay-Z.

It's oversimplifying things to say that the Wu alone helped the East Coast regain the hip-hop throne: acts such as Nas, Gang Starr and Mobb Deep were already keeping NY's flame burning. But it was Wu-Tang who delivered a killer blow from which the West Coast would never fully recover.




THEY HAD A PLAN (AND IT WORKED)


Before Wu-Tang formed, RZA and GZA had had shitty experiences with record labels: RZA was signed to Tommy Boy as Prince Rakeem, GZA to Cold Chillin' as The Genius. After both getting massively dicked around, they vowed to never let the music biz swallow them up again.

As a result, while Wu-Tang the *group* was signed to Loud Records, a carefully planned sequence of solo releases was spread across various different labels. That's a pretty standard set-up now – see Odd Future's multi-label deals – but at the time it was unheard of. In addition, the group retained tight control over every aspect of the Wu brand, from merchandising to promo videos.

"I had a five-year plan," says RZA, the group's dictatorial mastermind. "In 1992, I asked everyone to give me five years. I promised them we'd be number one in the charts. And in 1997, when those five years were up, we were: Wu-Tang Forever had just sold 600,000 copies in its first week."

CUBAN LINX INVENTED

Not only is Raekwon's 1995 album Only Built 4 Cuban Linx possibly the Wu's finest hour, it also single-handedly kick-started the craze for "mafioso rap" that gripped East Coast hip-hop for several years. Cuban Linx swapped the Wu's usual kung-fu stylings for Sicilian slang and Mafia-movie samples; within months, Nas, Biggie and Jay-Z had all released albums influenced by its cinematic sound (respectively: It Was Written, Life After Death and Reasonable Doubt).

Eventually, rappers relentlessly banging on about Scarface, The Godfather and "La Cosa Nostra" wore pretty thin. But for a brief moment there, mafioso rap was the best idea ever.



7 THEY'VE SOLD LOADS, BUT NEVER SOLD OUT

On the occasions when the Wu have scored a bona fide crossover hit, they've done so without knackering their rugged underground appeal. Tunes like ODB's Got Your Money, Method Man's You're All That I Need and Ghostface Killah's All That I Got Is You may have radio-friendly R'n'B-lady choruses, but they still somehow make sense sat next to hardcore cuts like Spot Rusherz and Shadowboxin'.

And while Wu-Tang's 2000 single Gravel Pit conquered the charts at the peak of hiphop's obsession with bling, the group let it be known that they preferred grime over glitz: "Can't stand Bentleys - they cost too much," shrugs Method Man on his verse.

WHAT'S YOUR **FAVOURITE** WILTANG CLAN

I used to roll around with my closest friends in my stolen BMW 325 IS in high school bumping the second disc (I didn't own disc one) of the Wu Tang Forever double disc album.

Every time I got in my car I would make sure to listen to Little Ghetto Boys at least twice. This is probably because at the time I was usually joined by either a group of disenfranchised folk, hip-hop fans, or people from an affluent area that enjoyed the rush of traveling in a stolen vehicle while listening to an opus of ghetto living, so it was a sure shot for whoever came along for the ride. Also I didn't steal the car. It was gifted to me that way.

WHO'S YOUR FAVOURITE MEMBER OF WU-TANG CLAN?

It's got to be Inspectah Deck. This is because he shined so brightly when involved in Wu-Tang or anything Wu-Tang affiliated - guest spots with other members, producing for other members etc - but fell short in his solo career. I feel this shows that he was most potent when he was with the rest of the Clan. Kind of like the Power Rangers. Not to mention his verse in Triumph, which is also a song from my favourite album, is irrefutable fire. Anyone that says otherwise can get slapped.

WHY DO YOU LOVE WU-TANG CLAN?

Because Wu-Tang Clain ain't nothin' to fuck with.

FAVOURITE WU-TANG CLAN SONG?

I've got to say C.R.E.A.M – that phrase is an

analogy of society from way back then up until today. It's deep but true. And it's one of the main reasons we decided to do what we do - to keep it moving, fuck the cashflow.

WHO'S YOUR FAVOURITE MEMBER OF WU-TANG CLAN?

Method Man because he's as cool as a mother trucker. So much love to Ol' Dirty Bastard as well - he's the original Brooklyn zookeeper.

WHY DO YOU LOVE WU-TANG CLAN?

They gave 90s hip-hop that unrelenting raw feel and inspired so many emcees. Oh and they're straightup gangster swaggadons. Word.

O THE RZA MADE BEATS FREAKY AGAIN

After the finger-clickin' smoothness of the West Coast G-funk era, RZA injected some oddness back into beat-making. His half-wonky, half-widescreen productions influence young beat-smiths today.

"RZA's production influenced me heavily," says The Last Skeptik, a UK producer who makes beats for the likes of Waka Flocka Flame. "It's in the way I chop samples, the way I aim for a cinematic, haunting sound. I learned from RZA that if your music doesn't scare kids, there's no point making it."



THE DEEPER YOU GO, THE MORE YOU FIND

Given that the extended Wu-Tang family - collectively dubbed the Wu Beez – has included more than 200 crews and artists over the last 20 years, there's an incredible amount of Wu-affiliated product out there. Granted, a lot of it isn't much cop. We wouldn't, for example, urge you to spend hours tracking down releases by Scotty Wotty, Ill Knob or Shorty Shitstain (and no, those are not madeup names). But there are tonnes of obscure Wu jewels to be found if you're willing to venture away from the wellknown classics.

"My favourite 'lost' Wu release is Masta Killa's solo album No Said Date," says The Last Skeptik. "It was sick. Unfortunately, nobody ever gave enough of a shit about him to raise him to the levels of your Method Mans and RZAs."



THEY SET THE

All of 2013's big hip-hop crews – ASAP Mob. Odd Future. Pro Era – follow the template first laid down by Wu-Tang: A) crew members can work together, work alone, or collaborate with outsiders. and B) every new release must add another layer to the crew's overall mythos. So will any of these hungry young crews ever topple Wu-Tang as the greatest of all time? Only time will tell. Although, realistically... no. No, they most probably won't.

WHO'S YOUR FAVOURITE **MEMBER OF WU-TANG?**

ODB. I love ODB, he was amazing. Obviously every time Method Man was on

a song he smashed it and sounded amazing and RZA too, but ODB was my favourite. I don't think RZA gets enough respect for his lyrics, he gets respect for being the leader but on Reunited he says "Talk strange like Björk". In New York rap at that time, people weren't referencing Björk! It's crazy!

WHAT'S YOUR FAVOURITE WU-TANG CLAN SONG?

Protect Ya Neck. It starts with a skit and we re-did it for our radio show. We cut it out and I got my mate to call in, and I'm like "What's up man?" And he's like, "Coolin man. Because, yo, I never ever call and ask you to play something right? I wanna hear that Wu-Tang joint!" We did our own version!

FAVOURITE WU-TANG CLAN SONG?

C.R.E.A.M. I love the sample. WHO IS YOUR FAVOURITE MEMBER OF WU-TANG?

Ol' Dirty Bastard cos he was real as it gets. WHY DO YOU LOVE WU-TANG CLAN? Wu-Tang showed a young brother from the streets of Houston what the street life was like in New York City. They let me know that

we all share the same struggle.

BURNING QUESTIONS ABOUT WU-TANG ANSWERED BY GENUINE WU-TANG MEMBER U-GOD

HOW OFTEN ARE ALL NINE OF YOU IN THE SAME ROOM AT THE SAME TIME?

Too much! Too fucking much, man. You've got to understand, I've been with some of these dudes since I was six, seven years old. I'm an old-ass man now. I can't get away from my brothers for shit. I'm Wu.

DID YOU THINK WU WOULD LAST THIS LONG?

Wu-Tang's a bunch of hustling motherfuckers. We came from the streets for real - all that stuff we rhymed about, I lived that. I carried a gun every fucking day from 14 to 22 when I got locked up. Did I know it would last twenty years? Kinda, because we're hustlers like that, Alright, we rhyme, but we also put the

footwork in and became globally successful. We gonna keep grinding until it's over. We're the illest group in the world.

DOES IT FEEL LIKE 20 YEARS SINCE 36 CHAMBERS?

No, not really. Life just goes by quickly. You can sit back and it'll go right past you. My last 20 years have been tours, losing a lot of friends, making new ones, creativity, hardship, good times, bad times, struggles, It's never gonna be a straight path. But how the fuck you gonna write some shit if you're gonna have an easy life? You gotta go through some type of struggle.

WHAT WAS THE BIG APPEAL OF KUNG FU MOVIES?

Back in the day I was a bit of a kung-fu fanatic, but I was more of a gangster motherfucker to tell you the truth. I liked the discipline, and the moral standards of martial arts and Asian culture, how they honour their fathers and train to become perfectionists at their craft. That's what I'm about. But I like the gun-fu shit, the gangster films like John Woo's The Killer.


HOW DOES THE EXTENDED WU **FAMILY WORK?**

We're still working on that -1 don't like to be under pressure to make music. I like to be free and let it come natural. Under pressure you start overcritically analysing everything. 






EY MICHAEL! HOW WAS THE TOUR YOU JUST FINISHED?

It's been great – we had some pretty packed gigs. We had nine shows in a row, which was intense. Sometimes you want to have a day off, but we went through and it was kind of a breeze – I'm surprised.

YOU PLAYED READING & LEEDS FESTIVAL BEFORE THIS TOUR, RIGHT?

Yeah! That was part of this tour, I guess.
WERE THEY YOUR FIRST 'PROPER'

Yeah, they were like the first 'proper' ones here, we'd only done city festivals like Dot To Dot and The Great Escape and some others before that.

HOW DID IT COMPARE?

Oh man, it's crazy, our first real festival was Lollapalooza, but people don't camp there, so it was kind of a trip. We don't have festivals like that in America. Josh our guitarist showed us the ropes.

WERE YOU HAPPY WITH THE TURNOUT FOR YOUR SLOT?

There was a lot of people, man! It was a really good turnout, I think we got a really good slot. We were really

stoked that people were watching us cos they could have been watching Eminem. It's kind of an interesting thing playing a festival like that.

ALL OF YOU GUYS WERE IN OTHER BANDS BEFORE SKATERS, HOW DID YOU ALL COME TOGETHER?

We all played in separate bands and all knew of each other. I'd never met Josh but he was dating a friend of mine, but our paths just never crossed – whenever he was in New York, I was in Los Angeles. We met one night at a party in Hollywood at this house in the Hollywood Hills, we stayed up all night and got along really well and started talking about how we both wanted to do something new. I told him I was heading to New York and leaving LA and said "Let's stay in touch and work on something if we can". It was one of the 'Let's start a band' conversations which happen often and have no follow-through. Then Josh just showed up in New York on a day's notice and we started the band that night and booked three shows the next morning and haven't stopped since.

YOU DON'T DO MANY SHOOTS, DO YOU?

We've done a bunch of shoots but we don't put loads of photos out. We just don't want to over-expose ourselves this early on.

YOU'VE GOT MATCHING ARMY **JACKETS - WHAT'S THE STORY** THERE?

It was a thing we started doing because we wanted to make bomber jackets for the band, like satin jackets that boxers have their team wearing. The thought behind it was kind of like that, but we couldn't afford to get them professionally made! We wanted them to look like Korean war jackets with a dragon on them, so we bought a bunch of army jackets and just painted on the back. It's a gang mentality thing.

WHY DID YOU DECIDE TO MOVE **AWAY FROM LOS ANGELES?**

I needed to get away. I'd lived in New York before I moved to LA. I'm an East Coast kid. Time can pass real quick in Los Angeles, you don't even know where it goes! It's cos every day is just perfect! Days are exactly the same there. I just wanted to work harder and move back to New York and start something fresh.

HOW DID YOU GUYS COME UP WITH THE NAME, BECAUSE IT'S WELL DOCUMENTED YOU GUYS DON'T **ACTUALLY SKATE...?**

The name SKATERS reminded us of our youth, it felt youthful and I wanted to write faster songs. It just reminded me of the attitude we had when we were kids when we had no plans and just went out to have a good time and go as hard as we could.

YORK AS A CITY AN INFLUENCE ON YOU GUYS?

Music aside New York definitely helps us work harder because people are up their ass way more than any other city. People take pride in over-working themselves there. The city motivates you not to be lazy. You don't have a lot of space there so you don't want to sit in your apartment, you'd rather go out and do shit.

WHERE IS IT YOU GUYS HANG IN NEW YORK?

The Lower East Side, Chinatown, pretty much below 14th Street. That's where all our friends hang out as well as where all the bars we hang out in are. We're all bartenders.

HAS WORKING AT A BAR AND SEEING CRAZY SHIT INFLUENCED YOUR WRITING?


Definitely, everything on the record that we're putting out is pretty much all inspired by New York, people that we knew, or things we learnt from the bars we worked in – all that shit. They're all just little tales from the city.

Yeah, we recorded it back in February. We went to LA to do additional recording and mixed it in the UK with Cenzo Townshend, but it's totally done. We're totally stoked on it, we were very picky about it.

It's got a different vibe because the EP didn't have that much of a direction, this new album has more of an aggressive vibe and the band has grown into a 'live' act which pretty much changed the sound.

WOULD YOU SAY THE BEST WAY TO LISTEN TO YOU GUYS IS IN A LIVE ENVIRONMENT?

After this record comes out that won't be the case, but right now the most representative thing we have to show is our live show. It's cos we've played so much in the past few years and we only have two songs out right now, that doesn't give you the full range of what we're doing as a band.

YOU RECORDED AT ELECTRIC LADY STUDIO, WHICH JIMI HENDRIX BUILT, THAT MUST HAVE BEEN INCREDIBLE!

It was amazing. It's right on 8th Street, so right in the thick of New York City. It's got such a vibe to it, you can tell that lots of records were recorded there and lots of them great records. There's loads of really helpful people that work there, too. If you don't want to, you don't have to leave the studio all day long and meals will be served to you. I've never been able to just have a full month in a studio before and just do whatever the fuck I want.

WAS IT YOUR IDEA OR THE LABEL'S TO RECORD THERE?

We picked the studio. We'd looked at a bunch of studios and Electric Lady was the one that met our needs. We didn't record in the main room, we recorded in a cool little room on the top floor which used to be Hendrix's crash pad when he was in the studio. It was originally a storage room but then they put in this ATI board and we stayed in that room for a whole month recording. **DID YOU RUN INTO ANY FAMOUS**

DID YOU RUN INTO ANY FAMOUS FACES WHILE YOU WERE RECORDING THERE?

I saw Yoko Ono, she was walking around and I said hello, which was pretty cool. I also saw Arcade Fire, but that's how it is there, you walk around and just say "What's up?" to people regardless of who they are.

AS A BAND IT SEEMS LIKE YOU GUYS HAVE A CLEAR VISION OF HOW YOU WANT TO BE PORTRAYED, WAS THAT ALWAYS THE INTENTION?

Not really, we're kind of picky people when it comes to how we're seen. It's not intentional, it's just our personalities.

COULD YOU TELL US ABOUT THE ZINE YOU SELL AT SHOWS?

The zine was an idea of ours because we have so many friends that helped us make album art or designed our website, a variety of stuff. We just wanted to give them credit. We wanted to put something out there to get our







HOW DOES A FILM WITH SO MANY COLLABORATORS COME ABOUT?

I became friends with the producers and after the first V/H/S film did really well, they were like "We wanna do part two!" They offered it to me and my friend Timo - we've been mates for six years and we'd actually been looking to collaborate on something, so we chose this. It was his idea for the storyline – an investigation into a cult on the day of reckoning, and I was immediately like "Oh fuck yeah, let's do it!"

WAS THERE ANY RIVALRY BETWEEN THE DIFFERENT DIRECTORS?

To start with we all sent our scripts in, but that was mainly to make sure that nobody was making the same film. Almost by accident we'd all stumbled upon the same kind of theme, an apocalypse kind of thing, so that became the central idea. For me, I'm a fan of all the directors, and you have mutual respect for each other's work, so it was more like we had to strive to make the best thing we could so that we didn't let the others down.

DID YOU THINK YOU'D GONE TOO FAR AT ANY POINT? YOUR SEGMENT IS PRETTY EXTREME...

Timo and I have worked in the Indonesian film industry for most of our careers and there are a few restrictions with what you're allowed to show. The one thing you can't even think about putting in is sexual content – I can kill as many people as I want, but two people fucking, NEVER! We knew we were making this for a western audience so we just decided to see how far we could go! We threw everything at the



CURSE OF CHUCKY, THE SIXTH FILM IN THE CHILD'S PLAY FRANCHISE IS OUT THIS MONTH, SO WE CHATTED TO ITS CREATOR ABOUT CHUCKY, SEX TOYS AND MATT DAMON...



SO HOW DID THIS COME ABOUT FOR THE SIXTH TIME?

After Seed Of Chucky, my partner David
Kirschner and I had been trying to get a remake of the original movie off the ground. It was during that time in

the ground. It was during that time in the mid-2000s when remakes were very en vogue – you had Halloween and Nightmare On Elm Street etc – but it kind of got mired in legal entanglements because of the rights. So eventually we just decided to make a film that's technically a sequel but was more similar in tone to the original. That was always the mission statement – we wanted to make Chucky scary again.

HOW DID YOU TACKLE THE DOLL THIS TIME? DID YOU USE ANY CGI?

Yes, but only in one shot, and it looks good! We tried to do it practically but the budget was too small to do what we'd done in the past where we used an oversized set and a little actor. There are a small number of shots where we used that technique, we used an actress called Debbie Carrington and she's awesome – she's been Chucky since Bride Of Chucky. She's also Thumbelina in the original Total Recall! But in this one particular scene it didn't work so I thought I

could justify using CGI because of the low light and stuff, but thank you for noticing, haha!

HOW DO YOU GO ABOUT MAKING A NEW DOLL EACH TIME?

The first four movies were made by Kevin Yagher, then Seed and this one was Tony Gardner. With this one we had to replicate the Good Guy doll from the original, we looked at photos and stuff, so it wasn't really too tough to do that. We've got two dolls, one which can't move and one which can. There are structural facial differences between the dolls - like a more prominent brow for example. There were moments using the movable doll where it looked weirdly sensual. There's a scene in the bathroom where he has these weird lips - it looks like a sex toy! We didn't like it at first and had to modify it - there were too many cooks in the kitchen and what first came out ended up looking like Matt Damon...

WHAT HAPPENS TO THE OLD CHUCKY DOLLS?

After every movie the dolls are put in a warehouse and they rot. It's the same with actors, directors and writers – it's like, "What have you done for us lately?" They put us in the warehouse until they need us again, and then they're like "Why haven't you called? I missed you!"

IS THE REMAKE GOING AHEAD?

It was never a separate project, so it's not going ahead at the mo. The rumour was actually started by Brad Dourif, who voices Chucky. It was abandoned after we decided to do the sequel but a lot of the creative ideas were carried over to Curse. It's not to say it couldn't happen at some point but I just think it's a better idea to do another sequel. People were saying that you should see more of Charles Lee Ray as a man, but I think what we did in Curse Of Chucky was just enough – you wanna see a doll, man!

KILLER DOLL MOVIES?

1. Trilogy Of Terror – It's a made-for-TV movie starring Karen Black and directed by Dan Curtis in the 70s. 2. Talking Tina – It's not a movie, it was an episode of The Twilight Zone with Telly Savalas.

3. Dead Of Night – An old British film from the 40s with Michael Redgrave. It's an omnibus film with five stories. It's really great if you haven't seen it. The last one is about a ventriloquist and his homicidal dummy.

4. Magic – A 1978 film with Anthony Hopkins, it's a feature riff on Dead Of Night. He plays a ventriloquist with a split personality, it's not supernatural but he talks through his dummy – he's like "KILL HER KILL HER!!" 5. Well I suppose it's gotta be Curse Of Chucky, hasn't it?

WHAT'S NEXT FROM YOU?

I'm kind of unemployed! I'm writing a spec script and I'm talking to Universal about doing another project, I'm juggling several balls. Hopefully this movie will do well because it's really hard to get something original made in Hollywood – everyone wants to do sequels and remakes, or I'm lucky that I actually created one. I'd like to do another one quickly, rather than wait another nine or ten years. I'd love to get more confident with directing.



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


